



John B. Troost President 2nd District

Most recently reappointed by Supervisor Burke, Commissioner John Troost has served the Commission on behalf of the Second District since 1977. During his time on the Commission, he has served as Vice Chair, 1980 -1982 and Chaired the Commission from 1982 –1984 and has been the Chair of the Education Committee, 1978 to present. He has served as a member on two, Handicapped Advisory Committee's for two Community Colleges, Los Angeles Southwest College, and Los Angeles Trade Technical College. He also represented the Commission from 1978 – 1982 as a member of the Citizen Advisory Committee for the Los Angeles County Parks and Recreation Dept., during the planning stages of the Kenneth Hahn Regional Park & Recreational Area in Baldwin Hills. He has served the City of Culver City as a member of their 504 Ad-hoc Committee and their Disability Advisory Committee.

Commissioner Troost holds an AA in History from El Camino College, and a BS & MS in Education from the University of Southern California. From 1989 to 1992, he worked as a Handicapped Specialist / Work Ability III Program Coordinator at LA Trade Technical College. Since 1995, he has been a member of the Culver City Optimist Club, a Service Club that donates toys to hospitalized children.

Commissioner Troost has over the past four decades, worked as a vocational counselor for various independent living programs, and has spent several years working within California's higher education system as a researcher, fundraiser, and teacher.



Janet A. Neal 1st Vice President 2nd District

Commissioner Janet A. Neal past President of the Commission, was appointed by Supervisor Yvonne Brathwaite-Burke in July 2003. Since her appointment to this Commission, she has held the office of Vice Chair in 2004-05 and Chair for two consecutive years in 2005-2007. Commissioner Neal brings to the Commission a background in education and community service as well as expertise in a variety of disciplines including consulting, media and entertainment, and music. Commissioner Neal has served on many councils, committees and commissions that address disability rights issues, including serving as a former member and President of the Los Angeles City Commission on Disability.

Commissioner Neal was born and raised in Los Angeles. During her professional career, she worked for over fourteen years in early childhood education and development, where she served as an administrator, director, and teacher in various pre-schools throughout Los Angeles County.

Commissioner Neal is the current host of the Commission's monthly talk show program, the "Disability Network", on KTYM Radio Station 1460 AM. She is a highly charismatic and caring program hostess, promoting disability awareness, community outreach, and providing a medium for open discussion on a range of topics and issues that affect people with disabilities and their families.

Commissioner Neal served as the former President of the Southern California Chapter of the Ehlers-Danlos Foundation, a position that she feels very passionately about, because she also has this disease. Now retired, Commissioner Neal works continuously to fight the realities of her disease while effectively serving on the Commission and advocating to improve the quality of life, increase opportunities, and raise the level of self-esteem for people of all ages with disabilities.



John R. James 2nd Vice President 2nd District

Commissioner John R. James was appointed to the Commission on Disabilities September 15, 2009. He is a Professor of Counseling and Assistance Director of the Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOP&S) at Pierce College.

He is very knowledgeable on the American on Disabilities Act and has been working in the Disabled Student Service programs at Los Angeles Mission and Pierce College for over 18 years.

Commissioner James has earned a Masters in Education from the University of Southern California and Bachelors in Geography and Urban Studies from California State University in Long Beach.

He is also a member of the Faculty Association of California Community Colleges and a member of the Pierce and Mission College Advisory Board on Disabilities.



Kecia B. Weller Treasurer 3rd District

Commissioner Weller was appointed by Supervisor Yaroslavsky of the 3rd District in January 2002. During her five years with the Commission, President Weller held the Office of Treasurer from 2003 to 2007. She has been a professional disability rights advocate for the past ten years. She represents consumer advocates in local and state agencies and organizations to pave the way for people with disabilities to gain access to employment, health care, dental insurance and paid vacations.

Commissioner Weller was the very first writer for People First of California State Advocacy Reporter, in which she covered self-advocacy news statewide. She is devoted to helping people with disabilities achieve equity and civil rights. Commissioner Weller is on the People First of California Board of Directors representing Los Angeles County.

Commissioner Weller participates with the Association of Regional Centers Agencies as a strong legislative advocate, and sat on the Steering Committee for the Unique People's Voting Project. She served on both the Santa Monica Disability Task Force and the Santa Monica Disability Community Accessibility Committee to advocate for the Santa Monica Disabilities Commission, where she served as founding Vice-Chair for one year. Commissioner Weller is a professional member of the National Association for Dual Diagnosis, and an Americans with Disability Act trainer. She has worked with and written several articles for the *National Self-Advocacy Board* newsletter, *Self-Advocates Becoming Empowered*, and served as its Region's 2nd Alternate. In addition, Commissioner Weller is an accomplished public speaker on a variety of topics.

Most recently, in late 2007, Commissioner Weller accepted a position as a teacher's assistant in one of UCLA's Extension Programs, the *Pathway Program* which is a new two-year certificate program designed for students with developmental disabilities, where she currently assists in an American Government Course.

Commissioner Wright is a member of the Afro-American Parent Group for Handicapped Children, and served as the President of the parent group at Rancho Del Valle of the Crippled Children's Society. STEVE MILLER Commissioner 5th DISTRICT

Born in Los Angeles, California, Steve Miller grew up in the San Fernando Valley. He graduated from Canoga Park High School and Pierce College; he earned his Masters degree from the University of California at Santa Barbara.

Following his post-graduate studies in the design and evaluation of social service programs, Mr. Miller served as Principal Program Evaluator for the Santa Barbara County Probation Department. During his research he discovered that a number of people on probation or parole were developmentally disabled adults, who had unintentionally become involved with the criminal justice system. Steve began to build the means for people with disabilities to participate more positively in society.

Mr. Miller career has been dedicated to assisting people with disabilities, by establishing programs leading to employment and independent living for thousands of Californians with developmental disabilities. Since 1990, Mr. Miller has served as Executive Director of Tierra Del Sol Foundation a community integration program, which has grown to serve more than 470 men and women in the San Fernando Valley and North Los Angeles County.

During his tenure at Tierra Del Sol, he has helped that agency move into a leadership role in demonstrating the truly significant contributions that people with disabilities can make to society.



Winslow C. Reitnouer Commissioner 5th District

Commissioner Reitnouer was appointed June 2011 by Supervisor Antonovich. She is an active San Marino community leader and former first grade teacher, Winnie Reitnouer began volunteering at Recording for the Blind & Dyslexic Inc. (RFB&D) L.A.'s Hollywood studio in 1980. RFB&D is a national organization which converts textbooks to accessible formats for print-disabled students. Text books and educational materials are read onto tapes and computer disks for students of all ages who are blind, learning, or physically disabled.

Ms. Reitnouer has served three terms on RFB&D-L.A.'s Board of Directors including a term on the National Board of Directors, sitting on the Unit Relations Committee as Liaison to Units in five different States.

She was honored with RFB&D-L.A.'s "Cherished Friends" Award at which time the Reitnouer family announced the establishment of the Winslow C. Reitnouer Scholarship, presented yearly to four High School or College students vigorously pursuing their goals.

Over the years she has organized, advised, chaired and participated in a wide variety of civic and charitable affairs. Having received countless awards and acknowledgements throughout the years she truly values her relationship with RFB&D and says, "One of my most precious memories is speaking to a blind student at UCSB, my Alma Mater, who said, after telling me he could not have been there without the audio textbooks prepared by RFB&D, 'I recognize your voice.'"



Edward A. Colley Commissioner 5th District

Commissioner Edward A. Colley was appointed to the Commission on Disabilities in 2011 by Mayor Antonovich of the Fifth District.

Commissioner Colley is a retired Captain from the United States Air Force. He teaches the Air Force Junior ROTC program at Valencia High School in Santa Clarita. He serves as the Board Vice President for Pleasantview Industries, a program for developmentally disabled adults and is on the elected Board for the Castaic Lake Water Agency. Commissioner Colley has earned both a Bachelor of Science and Master of Science degree in Electrical Engineering, and holds both a California Teaching credential and a School Administration credential.

Ed and his wife Kathy both live in Canyon Country and have six children. Both Ed and Kathy are Peer Mentors with the Tragedy Assistance Program for Survivors (T*A*P*S).



Wan Chun Chang Commissioner State Department of Rehabilitation

Commissioner Wan Chun Chang was appointed to the Commission on Disabilities in July 2007 and represents the State Department of Rehabilitation (DOR). She is currently a District Administrator for DOR in the Van Nuys/Foothill District where she contributes positively as an administrator. Commissioner Chang began her career with DOR in 1977 as a Vocational Rehabilitation trainee and became a Rehabilitation counselor in 1978. She was promoted to Senior Rehabilitation Counselor in 1987 and to Rehabilitation Supervisor at the East Los Angeles office in 1996.

Commissioner Chang is a strong consumer advocate, active community partner and inspiring leader with over 30 years experience in serving people with disabilities, and outstanding working knowledge with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).
